





The legal Framework for Trans-border Cooperation

BENELUX UNION has a set of instruments

- ✓ Base: the BENELUX treaty (ex: 540 decisions adopted at ministerial level since 1958)
- ✓ Complementarity to EU instruments
- ✓ In most cases framework agreements
- ✓ Relying (if necessary) on the Benelux institutional framework
- ✓ Supported by the expertise of the Benelux Secretariat general (+working groups)
- ✓ Allowing for legally binding decisions (without parliamentary ratification)
- ✓ With little bureaucratic red tape to formalise
- ✓ ... of various nature :
 - (1) based on specific Benelux legal instruments
 - (2) based on the Convention on cross-border and interterritorial cooperation

3 possible forms

Administrative agreement
Common organ
Benelux Grouping of territorial
cooperation (BGTC)

A flexible institutional framework

Without prior authorization

Own management of resources

For all public authorities/institutions

Transfer of headquarter without dissolution

A large thematic framework
